

From Worry to Wonder

July—time to show off the summer. With temperatures rising, so have hopes for a best-ever, garden-club flower show. Recruits are hastily enlisted to garner their best specimens and festive creations for presentation before astute judges.



Sounds a little intimidating, right? So it can, but it need not. I mean, until you try, you never know what you can come up with. All you really need is the ability to read, gather plant material and use multiple bits of imagination. What do you need to read? The all-important flowershow schedule, of Learn the course.

difference between a bloom and a spray, how to correctly present several blooms in one container, often included in specimen descriptions. In design categories, be sure to know the size requirements and what materials are acceptable. And if by chance, you run over size, you have still produced something beautiful to enjoy, no worries. You will want to decide which design/specimen categories to enter and select the containers. Here's a tip. Always plan how you will secure entries for transport. Old Styrofoam supports, boxes or larger pails should suffice.

Designers ultimately find their own times to gather and condition (put fresh cuttings in clean water to absorb moisture). I start cutting two days before the show. You can approach it at this stage in two ways: go find what you are looking for or go look for what you can find. In my experience, both options work equally well. Discover which option works best for you. See, you haven't even started and already you have learned

something. The next day, either the fun starts or worry sets in about how on earth are you going to comply with the requirements. I say, re-read the schedule and just start building. Make a frame for your design. Tall plants, skinny or fat ? Ring the edges with light and airy or short and heavy. Feature a bloom surrounded with



vibrant greens or place uneven numbers at different heights. Lean a twisted leaf over the side to balance that opposite slanted grassy bloom. Perhaps a strategically placed pine cone will add a serendipitous element. Now you're getting the picture. I can sense your worries dissipating as you complete this first design. Take a look from all sides. Every hole filled in? Ah, success. All that's needed now is a "rinse and repeat" for your remaining entries. Allow about an hour for each design. It will vary, of course.

Finally, as you line up your specimens and designs, you'll be treated to a plethora of wonder. Next day at the flower show, watch them do the same for others. No worries.

12 Years of Pants To NSAGC Club Members

2020 marks the twelfth year of the NSAGC Plant Giveaway Program in which every member of an NSAGC garden club is given a complimentary plant as a perk of membership with the NSAGC. Every year, the Board of Directors votes on the plant selection based on supplier availability and purchases the plants in bulk.

This year brings a change as the plants for the give-away will be in the form of young plants approximately 2" in size opposed to the traditional bareroots given in previous years. In addition to the complimentary plant, the NSAGC also offers its clubs the opportunity to purchase additional plants at a low fee. The extra plant sales sold out in record time again this year and orders were closed March 31st.

The perennial selected for 2020 is Balloon Flower "Fairy Snow" (*Playtcodon grandiflorus*). This perennial will form unique balloon-shaped buds that open into large 5 pointed lobed, 3-inch bell-shaped white flowers with blue veins. Emerging in late spring and blooming in summer forming a compact mound of

green foliage, with a flower height of 10 inches and a spread of 18 inches. Long-lived but dislikes being moved once established and grows best in full sun to partial shade, enjoying average to moist, well-drained soil. Zones 3-8.
