SCAM ALERT - NSAGC

I was caught up in a **scam** this summer involving an **NSAGC bank account** and one of the clubs that I was trying to e-Transfer grant money to. The municipality that they received the money from does not send to them directly. Instead, they send it to the NSAGC Treasurer who disperses the funds on their behalf. I thought that I was transferring money to the club President, but a scammer had gotten involved. Thankfully, I called the Royal Bank of Canada (**RBC**) who identified that I should speak with their **Security Department**. The **Security Department** representative explained: "what alerted them that something was not right is that the e-Transfer was in a pending status." As I talked with him, he was able to cancel the transaction before the money went to the scammers.

As a result of this situation and the recommendations of the RBC Security Department, I made a motion at the **September Board meeting** that will add security to our bank accounts and our money. The motion was "that e-Transfers are only sent to board members for approved expenses and trusted vendors (e.g., insurance, plants supplier, web site support). Cheques will be sent to anyone else (e.g., clubs, photo contest judges and winners)." The motion was unanimously approved.

The Security Representative warned me about **sending e-Transfers for online purchases** where the vendor is not known, such as *Facebook Marketplace*. He said that many times, the scammer gets the money and never sends the product. So many of us are now buying online and not thinking about the potential risks involved.

Have you had a call from a telephone number that you do not recognize, or have you had an email asking for your credit card information as they could not process your order, and I could go on and on! **Beware** - these calls or emails could be **scammers** at work. If you do not know how to block a call on your phone - call your service provider to learn more or simply do not answer the call or hang up if you are unsure to whom you are talking. Emails have scammers as well – learn what to do, if unsure who the email is from do not open it, if for example it is from your bank call your bank to ask about this email and they may transfer you to their cyber security department and ask you to forward to email to them – I have personally had this happen to me!



Following Judy's, we went to **Dave Jarvis and his wife Karen's** vegetable gardens. They are the founders of **We Feed Lunenburg**. Dave grows all his plants from seed and in spring shares many many young plants with anyone who would like to grow them and all he asks is you share some of the produce with those suffering from food insecurity. To create a larger gardening landscape, he has taken some of his gardens from ground level and has them growing up. He has made tunnels that you can walk through and see the squash and beans of every kind hanging. His raised beds and cloth bags are flowing with carrots, onions, garlic, lettuces, spinach etc. His green houses have rows of tomatoes already ripe and ready to share. He does have flowers here and there and his all-time favorite is Amaranth.



Nursery. Her many Tiffany lamps, which are family heirlooms, lit up the paths throughout the green house. Many of her plants are fourteen feet high and bearing fruit. She is working on surrounding her gardens with accessible water. She has made a pond with a lovely bridge that you cross to her greenhouse. **Annette's** energy and ability to create such an interesting nursery are worth a visit.
